

Dear Parishioners

This Sunday, we gather on Remembrance Sunday — a day when our nation pauses to recall with honour those men and women who laid down their lives in war, and all who have suffered the effects of conflict. We are invited to reflect on sacrifice, on memory, and on what it means to live as a people of hope in the light of Christ.

On this Sunday we remember. We remember the young and the old, those whose names are spoken at local memorials, those who travelled far from home, those whose bodies returned and those whose resting places are unknown. We remember their sacrifice, their courage and their service. As one preacher put it: "We remember young lives cut short ... they gave their lives for liberty, that we might enjoy the fruits of peace, justice and stability."

But remembrance is not merely looking back. Christian memory is also shaped by hope — by the faith that in Christ the brokenness of our world, including war and suffering, is held by God and transformed. So let me draw three reflections from this day:

The Cost of War and the Gravity of Sacrifice

When we pause at the two-minute silence, when we lay wreaths at memorials, we acknowledge that war is always tragic, costly and destructive. The letter to the Hebrews reminds us of Christ's once-and-for-all sacrifice; human sacrifice pales by comparison. In the wars of the last century and in recent conflicts, countless lives were changed, broken, lost. We acknowledge that cost. We mourn.

At the same time, how fitting it is that in our liturgy the first words we pray for the dead are: "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them." We pray that those who died not only rest in peace but live in Christ.

The Meaning of Memory and Re-Membering

One writer put it well: "Remembering" is not simply having a vague memory of something past, but "re-membering" bringing together what has been scattered, broken, into a whole, so that the story makes sense and speaks to us today.

In the Christian tradition we believe that in Christ the brokenness of our world, including war and suffering, is held by God and transformed. So when we remember those who died, we do so with the faith that their lives were held by God, that their sacrifice matters, and that through Christ even death is not the last word. On this day we remember all those who gave their lives for their country, all who suffered and died through acts of war and those who were left behind to grieve and mourn. This is not a mere historical moment, but a spiritual moment: memory bound up with hope.

Living the Call to Peace, Justice and Reconciliation

If we honour sacrifice, if we remember with hope, then our gratitude must lead to action. We are called to live as a people of peace, to build justice, to reconcile where division has taken root. As one reflection for Remembrance Sunday puts it:

"We gather today... and there are different aspects to our service. We thank God for those who have suffered as a result of war, and for those who have been disabled and injured in recent wars who suffer daily. [...] And at a funeral we also look to the future as we commit the deceased to God, sure of a certain hope in the eternal future God has for each one of us."

So the challenge: today's remembrance is not simply an act of looking back, but a challenge to us: how will our lives embody the love which conquers hatred, the hope which transforms despair, the peace which is stronger than conflict?

In practical terms: in our families, in our communities, in our nation — how will we show that the memory of sacrifice has shaped us? Will we care for the wounded, those suffering after conflict (physical, psychological, social)? Will we commit ourselves to peacemaking, to seeking the welfare of all, to breaking down walls of division? Because that is the Christian response to the memory of sacrifice.

So as we participate in the Act of Remembrance, as we observe the silence, as we lay our wreaths and listening hearts, let us do so in faith: faith that God's love holds all things, including death; faith that Christ's resurrection opens for us the promise of new life: faith that our thanks must become service.

May we carry the memory of sacrifice in our hearts, may it deepen our gratitude, and may it strengthen our resolve to live as disciples of the Prince of Peace — that the world may know and taste the fruit of the sacrifice we remember.

Mass Intentions

The diary for Mass intentions for 2026 opens this week. To enable as many people as possible to be able to have a Mass Intention we have the following guidelines.

Sunday Mass Intention - Fr Tom under Canon Law is obliged to offer a Mass for the People of the Parishes that he has care of. To make this fair, this Mass is said in the following pattern.

1st weekend of the month Saturday 6pm St Joseph's

2nd Weekend of the month Sunday 9.00am St Matthew's

3rd Weekend of the month Sunday 11.00am St Joseph's

4th Weekend of the month Sunday 6.00pm St Matthew's

(If there is a 5th Sunday of the month Fr Tom will allocate the Mass which is to be for the People of the Parishes)

To enable a range of Mass intentions, a Mass intention can only be offered on one Sunday in a month.

Weekday Mass Intention A Mass intention can only be offered once in a week. (Please be considerate when requesting a Mass intention to allow others to also have their intention).

Mass Intentions to be sent out of the parish. It is possible to have a Mass intention to be offered and said outside of the parish. These can be sent to those parishes that don't have enough Mass intentions or to priests in Religious Communities or Seminaries. If you would like this to happen, (or happy for it to happen) then please indicate to the office.

Mass Offerings. It is common when asking for a Mass Intention to offer a stipend. Although this goes towards helping the parish pay the priest, you are not 'Buying a Mass'. If you were paying for a sacrament then that would be the sin of Simony. The diocese suggest a recommended offering of £10. Some people give more and if someone can't afford that, then the Mass Intention and offering will be accepted (however small).

Thank you for all your intentions and offerings.

November is traditionally the month when we remember the Holy Souls. During that month all our Masses (apart from the People of the Parishes) will be offered for the Holy Souls. Envelopes are available at the back of church for you to put your list of names in with a donation towards a Mass stipend. Remembrance Reflection 2025

Fr Paul McCourt is a priest of the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle who has spent a quarter of a century serving as an army chaplain. In this reflection for Remembrance Sunday and Armistice Day, he talks about our remembrance observance as "an annual salute to that innate human instinct to protect peace and all who live by it, to protect life in all of its ages against threat, and to live by principles so hard won in times past."

There's something particularly special about the morning of the 11 November, the day we call Armistice Day. Here is the day when at the very hour of 11 o'clock, the nation pauses to do something unique and deeply poignant. We stop what we're doing, we stand still, we fall silent, as did the guns of war when the clock struck eleven on the eleventh day of the eleventh month in 1918.

It's impossible for us to imagine what the world had gone through in the four bitter years before then, with multiple nations at war with each other, and then the aftermath of rebuilding trust across the globe. What is of note was the immediate desire never to forget the terrible human cost of war on such scale.

The Cenotaph in Whitehall was erected in 1920 to be the main memorial for those who had given everything that we might have what we enjoy today in terms of democracy, freedom, and peace. It was replicated by many local memorials in every parish church, village, town, and city across the nation because there was barely a single corner of the country that had not lost someone from their community such was the scale and reach of loss.

With another world war only 20 years later and lasting for six years, followed by all the campaigns since in defence of world peace or national protection, the time of Remembrance has become the best way we can say a collective 'thank you' to so many who have protected and defended world order and our nation.

Therefore, what society does today and on Remembrance Sunday is an annual salute to that innate human instinct to protect peace and all who live by it, to protect life in all of its ages against threat, and to live by principles so hard won in times past. For all this and more, we say thank you to them and to God.

About Fr Paul McCourt

Fr Paul McCourt is a priest of the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle, ordained in 1990 after studies at St Cuthbert's College, Ushaw. After 10 years of parish ministry, he was approached to take up a part-time appointment with the Army as a Chaplain to Durham Army Cadet Force, before transferring as a Reserve Chaplain to a Field Hospital Unit in 2003 where he remained until 2013, completing a tour of Afghanistan in 2012.

A year with an infantry regiment led him to being appointed to a full-time position as a regular Army Chaplain in 2014, leaving the parish priesthood and the diocese that had been home for 24 years. He moved to Colchester to the Army's specialist Air Assault Brigade, before taking up the role of Catholic Chaplain to the Royal Military Academy, Sandhurst in December 2016. By 2018 a return to the Infantry preceded his current appointment with the Cavalry Regiment, The Light Dragoons and Operation Newcombe in Mali.
